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

# Label Bio:

Phantom Soundtracks label founder Darren Callahan, who has written drama for the BBC and the SyFy Channel, and also has released over 50 records of original music, has been a longtime fan of film soundtracks.

"I was drawn to them when I was young. I started buying soundtracks to films I wasn't old enough yet to see - 'Halloween,' 'The Island,' 'Escape from New York' - anything that I could find. I couldn't get into the movies yet because they were all rated R. But I wanted to have a part of that story. It was usually genre music for horror and science fiction during the late 1970s and early 1980s. If it came out in that period, I probably owned it."
